### Tips from Systems Security

Be on the lookout for COVID vaccine and stimulus check scams!

Hackers are never at a loss to leverage the latest news to their advantage. They know that everyone is eagerly awaiting more information on the availability of the COVID vaccine and when they will receive the latest stimulus check. This presents the hackers an opportunity to send out scam emails with instructions on how to receive your vaccine or stimulus check by providing some of your personal information or sending you to a website that automatically installs malware on your computer, or any number of scam attempts. Keep your guard up and be diligent about examining the emails and communiques you receive. Here are some tips to keep in mind:

1. Who is the communicate from? If it's an email, closely examine the sender's email address and domain. If you receive a phone call, ask the caller to identify themselves and ask for callback information that you can use to call them back if you get disconnected. Be suspicious if they are resistant.
2. What is being asked of you? Are you being asked to provide information or perform some task that seems unusual to you? This could be an indication of fraud.
3. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. You've heard that age-old saying and it is more true today than ever before.

# The Laptop I Didn't Know I Had

For a while I've been deciding whether or not I want to buy a laptop or a tablet for when I take my adventures on the road. While a tablet would be a nice portable option – important since I travel mostly by motorcycle or bicycle – a laptop would give me the most options when working – and playing – remotely. Also, the tablet would just be a bigger version of my phone which I already own. Still, even a laptop can take up valuable space when packing for a motorcycle trip, and is almost foolish to try and pack for a bicycle tour. As I pondered my decision, I wondered, just how much can my phone do for me?

My phone is a Galaxy S9+. It was Samsung's flagship phone a couple of years ago and is still a powerful device today. But all I ever did with it – other than falling down the YouTube rabbit hole WAAY past my bedtime was paying my bills, texting, and taking photos so I didn't have to write down notes. That is until a couple of months ago, when I rediscovered Samsung DeX.

Years ago, Samsung began work on a desktop version of the Android operating system that ran on their Galaxy phones. Their idea was to enable support for an external display to be connected to their phones and, instead of simply mirroring the phone's screen, create a desktop environment that you could navigate with a mouse and keyboard. Their phones were already as powerful as entry level laptops, they just needed a bigger screen. I tried it out back when I had my Galaxy S4 (2014?) and it was... a bit of a mess. I could see what they were trying to do, but it just wasn't useful enough to replace a laptop.

Last spring, when the thought of working remotely hit me that I could really work from *anywhere* with an Internet connection, I wondered, "Hey, I have a pretty powerful phone, is that DeX idea still a thing?"

Today, from my Galaxy S9+, a 17-inch portable display, and a Bluetooth keyboard and mouse, I am able to:

- Join and host Zoom calls using the camera and mic from the phone. I can even share content like
- PowerPoint presentations using Zoom for Android and PowerPoint for Android.
- Access my COC email, calendar, and OneDrive using Microsoft Outlook and OneDrive for Android.
- Fill out timesheets and overtime forms and submit them for signatures using Adobe Acrobat and Adobe Sign for Android.
- Create and edit simple videos using Adobe Rush for Android.
- And if I absolutely NEED a Windows desktop, I can remote into my laptop at work using FortiClient VPN and Microsoft Remote Desktop Client for Android. At that point I have access to any Windows program that is installed on it.

And, since I'm using my phone, I have the option of using WiFi or my unlimited data plan, which means that I can – theoretically – work from anywhere that I have a data connection. Perhaps one of these days, I'll try working from a picnic bench at my local park, trailside at my favorite biking destination, or take a long motorcycle ride up to the mountains and find a nice spot lakeside. Just don't tell my boss!
