About HBCUs

Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) have an excellent academic track record. While only about 17 percent of black undergraduate students attend an HBCU, more than 28 percent of African-Americans who receive bachelor's degrees obtain them from an HBCU. These colleges and universities are also leading institutions in awarding degrees to African-American students in life sciences, physical sciences, mathematics and engineering programs.

Thanks to an agreement signed on March 17, 2015 between the California Community Colleges and numerous HBCUs, California community college students who complete certain academic requirements are guaranteed transfer to a participating HBCU.

HBCUs were established primarily to serve the higher education needs of the African-American community, however they are open to students of all ethnicities. There are more than 100 HBCUs in the country, with most located in the South and on the East Coast. Most award bachelor's degrees in many fields. Some also award master's and doctorate degrees.



Transfer Guarantee to Historically Black Colleges & Universities

California community college students at our 114 colleges are guaranteed admission to several Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) throughout the United States.

HBCU Transfer Information

The HBCU Transfer Guarantee Program ensures a smooth transition for students from California community colleges to participating HBCUs. The simplified transfer process can reduce a student's need to take unnecessary courses, and can shorten the time to degree completion, resulting in a significant cost savings.

By completing the general education requirements for the University of California and California State University systems known as the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education-Breadth (CSU GE) pattern and obtaining a transfer-level associate degree (60 units) with a 2.5 or higher grade point average, students are guaranteed admission with junior standing to participating HBCUs.

Students may also opt to transfer with 30 or more University of California or California State University transferable units and a 2.5 or higher grade point average. Units will be accepted for general education, pre-major or elective units.
